- Ask the school counselor to set up a "contract" with your student with goals for attendance, and rewards and consequences.
- Set up a time to talk with the school counselor about attendance and any concerns.
- Ask about counseling services or a mentor for your student.
- Are there after school or extra-curricular programs to help keep your student interested in school.


National Suicide Prevention Month

Suicide is the second leading cause of death among school age youth. However, suicide is preventable. Youth who are contemplating suicide frequently give warning signs of their distress. Parents, teachers, and friends are in a key position to pick up on these signs and get help. Most important is to never take these warning signs lightly or promise to keep them secret. When all adults and students in the school community are committed to making suicide prevention a priority, and are empowered to take the correct actions, we can help youth before they engage in behavior with irreversible consequences.

For Parents - What Can You Do to Help a Youth?

Parents/ Guardians should always take any reference to suicide or warning signs of suicide seriously. Never ignore these signs. If your child is in immediate risk parents should take them immediately to an emergency room for evaluation.

If your child is aware of a friend expressing or exhibiting warnings signs that indicate immediate risk, parents can contact their local law enforcement agency and ask for a welfare check on that student, or reach out to the school.





October is National Bullying Prevention Month

Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior among school-aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time. Bullying includes actions such as making threats, spreading rumors, attacking someone physically or verbally, and excluding someone from a group on purpose. Bullying can also take place through technology, known as cyberbullying. Examples of cyberbullying include mean text messages or emails, rumors sent by email or posted on social networking sites, and embarrassing pictures, videos, websites, or fake profiles.

There are many other types of aggressive behavior that don't fit the definition of bullying. This does not mean that they are any less serious or require less attention than bullying. Rather, these behaviors require different prevention and response strategies. Please reach out to Ms. Mourino or your child's counselor if you are concerned about bullying.
